Scripture Reading James 5:13-20 read by Margriet Wells

¹³ Is anyone among you in trouble? Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. ¹⁴ Is anyone among you ill? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. ¹⁵ And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be

forgiven. ¹⁶ Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

¹⁷ Elijah was a human being, even as we are. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for three and a half years. ¹⁸ Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops.

¹⁹ My brothers and sisters, if one of you should wander from the truth and someone should bring that person back, ²⁰ remember this: whoever turns a sinner from the error of their way will save them from death and cover over a multitude of sins.

James 5.13-20

James ties together a number of different ideas about prayer, which he presents as the proper response to any and all human experiences, whether his readers are cheerful or suffering. His own belief in the power of faithful prayer

for healing and forgiveness is evident, and perhaps based on personal experience. But he also implies a belief that prayer can influence the elements in his detailed reference to Elijah. Finally, in this reading, James moves from prayer for the forgiveness of one's own sins, to reconciliation with the Christian community for those who have



Ask yourself: How do you feel about the call to be brave enough to BE the light?

REFLECT

Play some quiet music while you reflect on these words from Mother Teresa, 'To be able to love one another, we must pray much, for prayer gives a clean heart and a clean heart can see God in our neighbour. If now we have no peace, it is because we have forgotten how to see God in one another...' Consider somebody and think about how you can see God in them.

Write

Sometimes the hardest thing can be to see God in ourselves. We often find it much easier to focus on what we think is wrong with us, than what is good. Write your name on the top of a piece of paper. If you can do this with others, pass each piece of paper around everyone in turn. Everyone should write a quality of God that they see in the person named, at the top of the piece of paper, until the paper returns to its owner. If you are on your own, ask God to reveal to you, how he is at work in your life and write those things down.



Make a cake using a simple recipe. For each ingredient (eggs, flour, sugar, butter) think of two other items that can be made with that ingredient (omelette, bread, etc.). Just like the same eggs or flour can look and taste very different from one creation to another – depending on what else has been added and how ingredients have been treated, God can look very different in one person to another. Our cultures, backgrounds, experiences and personalities mean we all show God in different ways – but it's the same God in us all.
